Evel Knievel: Daredevil Supreme


When he was only eight years old, Evel (whose real name is Robert) saw a daredevil car show and decided that he wanted to be a motorcycle stunt rider when he grew up.


Daredevil Dreams

In 1965 Evel Knievel formed a stunt group called *Evel Knievel's Motorcycle Daredevils*.

They performed all sorts of spectacular jumps.

They jumped through fire and over packs of mountain lions and rattlesnakes.





Evel kept increasing the size of the jumps he made. He bragged that one day he would jump over the Grand Canyon. But when he jumped the fountains at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, he crash-landed badly and was in the hospital for a month.

In Evel's hometown of Butte, Montana there's an annual celebration called *Evel Knievel Daze*.







In 1976, Evel was seriously injured trying to jump over a tank of man-eating sharks in Chicago. He was horrified to learn that a cameraman who was filming the jump was also injured. Evel decided it was time to retire before he performed one stunt too many. He certainly didn't want anyone else to be hurt.

Crash and Burn?

Between 1968 and 1976 Evel performed many jumps over cars and trucks. After jumping over 13 double-decker buses, he crashed and broke his **pelvis**. This injury didn't stop him. Five months later he successfully jumped over 14 Greyhound buses.

UPSIDE DOWN
